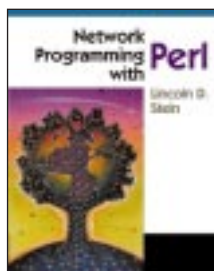

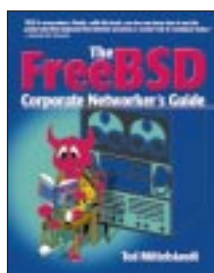
"Coming Soon!"

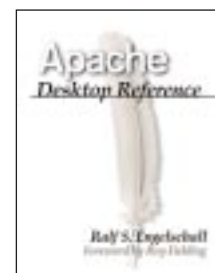
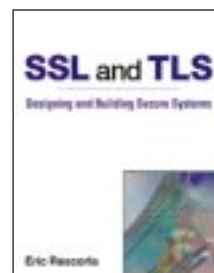
